Alice and Stan were actively involved in the Sweden community for well over 80 years, and celebrated their 72nd wedding anniversary a day before Alice passed away on November 25, 2022, at the age of 97. Alice lived her entire life in Sweden, attending a single room schoolhouse through Grade 8, and joined the Sweden Grange in 1940. Both were active members of the Sweden Community Church and the South Bridgton

Church, and Alice often volunteered to bake community suppers. In 1948, Stan was one of the four founding members of the Sweden Volunteer Fire Department. To this day he attends fire department functions, whenever possible. Stan met Alice in 1948, they were married in 1950, they ran a greenhouse in the 60's and had an obvious love for plants. Stan worked for many years for the Town of Sweden and the State of Maine Public Works. Stan always has a smile on his face and a cheerful greeting for all. One of his fondest memories of Alice is that without fail, every night before they went to sleep, they would gaze into each other's eyes and say, "good night, I love you."



Anne (Anna) Hommes

Fiercely independent, pragmatic, deeply involved in the community, and with a passion for education, Anne is remembered as a role model who truly lived her values and made space for people to show up. Originally from the Netherlands, she emigrated to Maine with her childhood sweetheart, Tjaard, who was latter named Senior Minister at Fryeburg Community Church. Anne began her career as a social worker, and she and Tjaard spent 20 years as missionaries in Indondesia, helping others through establishing education programs, and training and mentoring university students in pastoral theology and outreach. She enjoyed her community of

lifetime Sweden friends, and was a faithful member of the Sweden Community Church, Lovell Library Page Turners Book club, and the Sweden ladies walking group. Understated about her accomplishments, she had an artistic aesthetic, and unconditional love for all. Anne passed away on March 16, 2022 at the age of 93, with her children by her side. Her ashes lie together with Tjaard's, under an apple tree in their field on the hilltop of Plummer Mountain. Her family is grateful to the community of Sweden that allowed her to "age at home" in a place she treasured.

2022 Select Board Report

To all Sweden residents and taxpayers,

2022 presented a number of challenges, but also a significant number of developments that we feel are helping to move us forward as a municipality focused on working with, and for our town's people, with the goal of preserving and improving the character of our historic town.

First we have to highlight our appreciation for those who work for the Town, and also all who volunteer their time and skills on committees and boards in service of the Town of Sweden. Volunteering can feel thankless at times, but it is through these efforts and diverse opinions that the best outcomes emerge.

After a long stretch of staffing issues, we finally have all positions filled with Alberta Ridlon serving as Town Clerk, Linda Moynihan as Tax Collector, Angela Thomas as Treasurer, Peter Gordon as CEO, and Rose McKenzie as our Select Board Administrative Assistant. Much gratitude to Rose for taking on so many of those tasks during a difficult period, and to Alberta for stepping down as Selectperson to keep the Town Office functioning. Alberta will be retiring this year, but will stay on to train her replacement. The Town elected new Select Board members Dan McQueen and Kerry Welton in the later part of 2022, and together we have worked toward completing a long list of objectives, including adopting a Town Purchasing Policy, Ethics Policy, Code of Conduct Policy, Solar Energy Ordinance, and a Boat Launching Policy for Keyes Pond.

Many will appreciate that we were able to complete the audit in time for printing this 2022 annual report, and have included financials. And, after many years in limbo, plans for the Fire Station were approved, and the town is moving forward to secure grant money and USDA funding for building. The Town Meeting Hall saw a complete exterior renovation in 2022, with budgeted plans for improvements to the Town Offices for 2023. Additionally, CEO Peter Gordon has worked through a backlog of permitting and enforcement issues.

Roads were a challenge in 2022, with multiple storms in December causing extreme damage and washing out the Haskell Hill Road culvert. Almost all residents were affected by multi-day power outages and loss of landlines. Addressing both of these critical issues in 2023, the Select Board is working on solutions to replace the temporary fix on Haskell Hill Road using Federal Emergency funds, create a timeline for permanent repairs to several town roads using capital improvement money, and establish a new communication system to alert all resident via either text message or landline of emergency notifications, town meetings, or other important notifications.

Through our participation with Eastern Slope Broadband (ESRB), we expect to have more information this year about bringing affordable high speed broadband to all town residents. By improving infrastructure and communications, our goal is to not only maintain but to improve the quality of life in our town. We look forward to serving the people of Sweden, and encourage our residents and taxpayers to get involved.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.

Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. Another ongoing threat to Maine's small businesses is the shortage of workers. That's why I led an effort to push the Administration to nearly double the number of H-2B visas that are critical to our hospitality industry. Additionally, when the Administration proposed to cut the construction of a destroyer to be built by Bath Iron Works, I restored this funding to protect Maine jobs and our national security.

When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My *AUTO for Vets Act* also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. Dear Friends,

I've often thought that Maine is just one big small town connected by long roads. Well, in the past year or two, those roads have gotten steeper and bumpier as we dealt with an unprecedented pandemic and the resulting economic troubles.

As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. These efforts will lay the foundation for Maine's 21st century economy and make sure even the most rural areas aren't left behind.

Over the last two years, as we drove up and down our state, you couldn't help but see storefronts in trouble and prices rising as the economy struggled through a global recession. And again, while you focused your efforts on getting through the difficult times, Congress took meaningful action. We passed the *American Rescue Plan* in 2021, which enabled Governor Mills and the state of Maine to better meet the health and economic difficulties of the pandemic. At a critical moment it expanded healthcare efforts to confront COVID and invested in the state to keep the economy in far better shape than most others nationwide.

Congress didn't stop there. This year, we took even more concrete steps to cut costs, create jobs, and provide more affordable, cleaner energy. The bipartisan *CHIPS Act* will bring home the manufacturing of the technical components known as "chips" that are used in everything these days – from smartphones to microwaves to cars – and in doing so reduce prices and create good American jobs. We also passed the *Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)* to lower healthcare costs, allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices, and cut energy bills with new rebates for things like heat pumps and solar panels.

Beyond these major investments, we also passed vital legislation to improve the day-to-day lives of Maine people and Americans nationwide. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. Mary and I wish you a happy, and safe 2023.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I've been working on behalf of the people of the Second Congressional District.

In August, I voted for the *Inflation Reduction Act* because it represented a dramatic turnaround from misguided efforts to pass sweeping, ill-designed legislation that tried to accomplish too many things through budget gimmicks, setting up problematic fiscal cliffs in numerous programs and refusing to make the difficult decisions to allow for a fiscally responsible bill.

The *Inflation Reduction Act*, which was signed into law by the president, was fiscally responsible and targeted four key priorities: reducing our national debt and putting our country back on a more sustainable path, lowering the cost of prescription drugs, and making health care more affordable, investing in an all-of-the-above energy strategy to significantly increase oil, gas, and renewable energy production to lower energy costs for Americans, and cracking down on the tax avoidance of billion-dollar multinational corporations. This bill was the first major legislation in the last decade to use the reconciliation process to create a fiscally responsible budget to reduce deficits. The Congressional Budget Office estimated it would reduce deficits by approximately \$300 billion.

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I also helped pass the Fiscal Year 2023 National Defense Authorization Act, which among other things, included key wins for Bath shipbuilders, UMaine, and servicemembers and their families. For shipbuilders, the bill secured authorization for a third DDG-51 destroyer; established a new contract for up to 15 DDG-51 destroyers over the next five years, many of which will be built at Bath Iron Works; and included funding for shipyard infrastructure. The bill also authorized over \$25 million for defense research programs, including UMaine's large-scale manufacturing program. Finally, the bill authorized a 4.6% pay increase to help servicemembers and their families deal with rising costs due to inflation.

Additionally, at the end of 2022, Congress passed a spending bill to fund the government through September of 2023. The bill funds nearly \$27 million in funding for community projects across the Second Congressional District, a lifeline for our lobster industry that freezes any regulatory action for at least six years, and secures millions in additional funding for the Low Income Housing Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to help Mainers heat their homes.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help answer questions about and navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. We are adding two new computers, a scanner, copy machine and internet service to better serve our community thanks to the Town of Sweden.

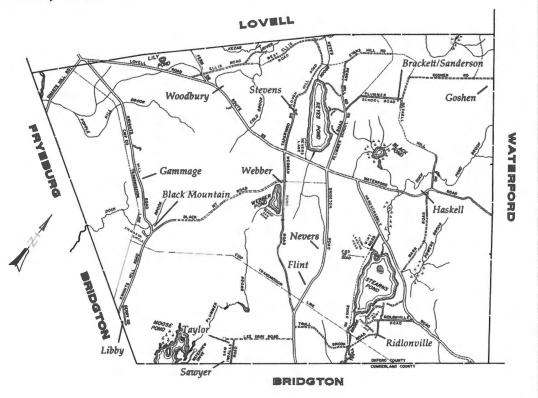

HIGHLIGHTS

- Regular meetings of the MSAD 72 Board of Education are held on the second Wednesday of the month at 7 PM at the Molly Ockett School gymnasium. Additional budget meetings commence in April. These are open to the public. Agendas and meeting minutes can be found on the district website <u>https://www.msad72.org</u>.
- Administrators report that there are challenges with student and staff absences due to illness but coordination and cooperation from team members has assured coverage for classrooms.
- A survey went out to parents in the spring. Results were reported by school and were mostly positive. The scores showed that communication is good among parents and teachers/administrators. Children also report that they feel safe at school. Additional opportunities for parent feedback are in the very early stages. Soliciting opinions from families to help us plan and budget for improvements.
- The pandemic has had a significant impact on learning and social development of students. Several initiatives have been introduced to assure that schools are supporting students' academic, social and behavioral needs.
- The school District has a FB presence. The account is called "Maine School Administrative District 72".
- This is a relatively large Board with 22 members. A workshop on boardsmanship is offered regularly by Maine School Board Association (MSMA).

2022 was a challenging year for the Department. Our personnel put in 656 hours of training. The Department responded to an unprecedented 82 calls for service as outlined below. We ended the year with two major storm events.

A Fire Station is of the highest priority. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Fire Station Building Committee for finalizing the Station plan. At this point we are waiting on financing and final Town approval. Over the last year Bridgton Fire has graciously housed our Engine 4 in their Central Station. They have a new truck scheduled for delivery this summer, so we will lose that space for our truck.

The Department was awarded three Grants this year: AFG Grant for radios which will increase agency interoperability, a Forestry Grant for Personal Protective Forestry Gear and a Traffic Control Equipment Grant.

Department members participated in Sweden Community Events. It was a pleasure working together with this Community.

We would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and citizens of Sweden for their continued support. Our Mission continues to be to provide the best service possible for the Community.

Sweden Office of Emergency Management – Report

Greetings Sweden Residents,

I was elected at last year's Annual Town Meeting as your EMA Director, and I thank you for the opportunity to serve your community.

Generally, Sweden is a quiet community with some small emergency incidents that occur now and then. As part of my duties, I took to task the updating of the Town's Emergency Operations Plan. This plan is now updated and in effect.

The Town was in the process to purchase a generator for the Meeting House, and I was able to secure a Grant from Maine Emergency Management Agency/FEMA to help fund this project. The Grant Fund of \$4,250.00 was for a 50% match which helped cover some of the expenses of the new generator. With that said, the project is complete, and the generator is on-line.

In late December, on the 23rd, Winter Storm Elliott occurred and hit us hard, with power outages, wind, snow, rain, and down trees. We experienced a huge amount of rain that filled the brooks. This flooding caused the culvert at Haskell Hill Road, Duck Pond Brook washout. As the wash out was occurring, the pavement over the culvert gave the appearance of the roadway being intact. One of the residents on the road was crossing over the brook and suddenly plunged in, her vehicle was washed downstream a short distance and then came to rest. She was able to call a neighbor for help and was assisted out without injury. The brook crossing was completely gone.

I'm happy to say that with the work of the Selectboard, roadcrew, fire department, and EMA a temporary bridge was in place in less than 24 hours and the roadway reopened. Outstanding work by all!

Many other roads were also impacted by the storm with some large washouts. The initial damage assessment to the town infrastructure totaled more than \$500,000.00. The declaration for Disaster is still pending. In January, Town Officials met with FEMA here in town to view the damage.

The Town of Sweden is working hard to mitigate the damage and make the town complete again. This is going to be a long-term project to recovery.

2022 Annual Town Report

Dear Neighbors, Residents, and Taxpayers,

As I enter my fifth year as Sheriff, I am extremely proud of the work our office has accomplished throughout our western Maine communities, and I am motivated about the momentum our office has heading into the New Year. This would not be possible without the dedicated team of men and women who have continued to serve our mission and protect our communities, with professionalism, integrity, and leadership. It is their work that keeps our agency moving forward.

As I have mentioned in previous years, our calls to service have continued to increase in volume as well as their complexity. Our patrol division handled nearly 14,000 calls to service this past year, with more calls regarding mental health concerns since 2020. This speaks to the need for state funding for services for our communities and our sheriff's departments throughout the state, to keep individuals needing help, and others around them, safe.

We have continued to improve our visibility and response times by utilizing our substations in Dixfield, Brownfield, Rumford, and Bethel. As promised, over this past year, our office successfully completed the plans to convert the jail facilities from a 72-hour holding facility back to a full-service operation. The jail received its full accreditation this past October, and with this accomplishment completed, this improvement has restored local control and has already saved taxpayers money. In 2022, our corrections officers and jail administrators processed 1,795 bookings.

We have continued our efforts to combat the opioid epidemic in Oxford County by supporting local organizations such as the Western Maine Addiction Recovery Initiative by referring eligible individuals, inflicted by substance use disorder, to Project Save ME. The program is a police-assisted initiative designed to connect those burdened by substance use disorder with recovery coaches, advocates, and other treatment services to assist them with their recovery journey.

On behalf of the deputies, correctional officers, and support staff, I want to thank and acknowledge the continued community support we have received. Our deputies and staff have gone above the call to service, and I am happy to hear and see that their work has not gone unnoticed.

Town of Sweden, Maine 2023 Budget Committee

According to the Town of Sweden Budget Committee Ordinance, it is the responsibility of the Budget Committee (BC) to make recommendations to the Select Board (SB) and to the Town on all matters related to the Town's budget. The BC has done their best to support the budget for 2023 as proposed by the Select Board.

Articles 9 and 9a. Maintenance of roadsides and the Capital Improvement Reserve Account for Roads. The Town has a legal obligation to maintain public roads and we all agree that funds must be raised to make that possible. Due to the instability of material and fuel costs.one budget committee member would like to see some additional funds raised specifically for maintenance.

Article 13a. Capital Account for Town buildings. For health and safety reasons and to maintain the Town's assets, funds are required for the repair and maintenance of Town buildings. In addition, the Town office requires some upgrades to accommodate 5 staff members where only 2 staff members were working in the office when the Town office was first inhabited in 2006.

Where the budget committee votes were not recorded in the warrant, it was only because the Committee was unable to meet on the Select Board's recommendations prior to the warrant being signed for the Town report. However, the Committee was able to vote prior to the Town report going to the printer as follows:

The Capital Reserve Account was established to allow the Town to properly prepare and plan for long term solutions to Town roads that are in disrepair. Occasionally emergency situations arise, such as the washout of the Haskell Hill culvert; and the town is fortunate to have the resources available to manage them. Efforts that are being made to obtain funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to ease the financial burden on town resources are greatly appreciated. If the Town can recoup the expenses for the Haskell Hill culvert, the Capital Account will be available for the repair of other roads. If not, the Capital Fund is available to replace the washed-out culvert, which has temporarily been replaced with a logging bridge.

<u>Article 45.</u> To see if the Town will authorize or direct the Select Board to use up to \$186,000 of LRAP funds if needed. Select Board recommends (3-0) Budget Committee recommends (3-0)

<u>Article 47.</u> To see if the Town will authorize the Select Board to take from the unassigned fund balance up to \$415,000 for engineering and to replace the Haskell Hill Bridge with a box culvert.

One member of the Budget Committee who is also a member of the Road Advisory Committee, recognizes that the bridge needs to be replaced, but thinks that another option may be less expensive.

Article 48. To see if the Town will take from the unassigned fund balance up to \$50,000 for emergency road work. Select Board recommends (3-0) Budget Committee recommends (3-0)

Emergency road work was required after several severe winter storms, including the installation of a temporary bridge at Haskell Hill Rd. Again, the efforts being made to recoup some or all of these expenses if at all possible, are greatly appreciated.

Waste Disposal and Recycling
