
Ken Forde

Ken was born and raised in MA, moving to Dover, NH when he married his wife Jane in 1964. They raised their two sons there, and Ken worked as a systems analyst for Davidson Textron for 27 years.

The family spent weekends at their camp on Stearns Pond in Sweden, and Ken began testing the water quality of the Pond for Lakes Environmental Association (LEA) in 1983. After Ken retired in 1993, he and Jane moved to Sweden full time. Joining the board of LEA in 1994, Ken served as Treasurer until 2009, and he and Jane became two of the organization's most faithful volunteers. His strong financial and organizational skills were evident as he was able to get people working together for the greater good. Ken served six

years on the Town of Sweden's Select Board, including five years as chairman, then spent several more years on the budget committee, the planning board, tax committee and the 2004 Comprehensive Planning Committee. He continued to work hard for the Town of Sweden even after he gave up his formal positions.

Ken died Nov. 11, 2011, of injuries sustained when a dead tree fell while he was stacking wood. Ken set the standard for what it means to serve your community. He didn't care about getting the credit, he cared about getting the job done well. In Ken's memory, his wife Jane is donating six new flags to the Sweden Fire Department.



Sam Black

Born and raised in Illinois, Sam Black first came to Maine in the early 1960's at the urging of his wife, Sue, who had worked as a counselor at Camp Wyonegonic in the 1950s. After spending autumn vacations on Moose Pond in Denmark, in 1969 Sam and Sue bought the old Sawyer farmhouse on what is now Sam Ingalls Road. At the time, Sam was in the middle of a career serving as an officer in the U.S. Marine Corps, so he and Sue used the farmhouse as a second home, visiting whenever possible until Sam retired in 1980 and they moved to Sweden permanently.

As soon as he took up residence in town, Sam became involved in the community. While Sue worked in local schools and libraries, Sam was more low-key and "behind the scenes." He pursued his passion of restoring his old

house, which is featured in "Big House, Little House, Back House, Barn," as well as the Sweden Historical Society's "Living, Learning, and Worshipping: Buildings of Sweden, Maine 1813-1913." An engineer by training, he was especially fond of restoring the old stone walls surrounding the fields on his property, which can be seen when driving by the house.

Sam and Sue joined the Sweden Community Church, and Sam served on the Sweden Volunteer Fire Association for a number of years. His military training and attention to detail served him well on the Planning Board and while working to develop the town's first Comprehensive Plan, which has provided a solid foundation for subsequent updates. He has also maintained the Sawyer Cemetery on his property and has always been willing to help with various town projects over the years.

Sam has been deeply committed to making Sweden the best place it can be for those who live in and visit the town. His contributions continue to help the town move forward in thoughtful and sustainable ways.

2023 Select Board Report

Greeting all,

In 2023, the Town made significant progress improving our roads and buildings, planning for future infrastructure investments, and expanding how we communicate with residents and taxpayers of Sweden. One of our greatest assets is our people, and we are especially grateful for town employees and volunteers who have worked tirelessly with federal and state agencies this past year to lessen the financial impact of recent weather related disasters.

ROADS: Roads were a big focus this past year, with nearly 2 miles of Webber Pond Road being reclaimed and paved, including extensive ditching and culvert work to mitigate future damage. Our Undesignated Fund Balance (UFB, aka surplus fund) was tapped to pay for the emergency repair of the Haskell Hill Road bridge, which was completed in September 2023. Our EMA Director is working diligently to recover up to 80% of the repair cost from FEMA disaster relief funds, in addition to repair costs for other damaged roads. Repairs and mitigation fixes have been completed on many of these roads already. Several repair projects are scheduled for 2024, including fixing and repaving the most damaged sections of Hardscrabble Road, as well as restoring Trull Brook Road, in part using FEMA money.

BUILDINGS: Exterior improvements were made to the Town Meeting House, with the original antique shutters repaired, repainted and rehung. The side entry roof and door were repaired, and a generator installed. Looking forward, we plan to address interior updates, including modernizing the kitchen. Our Sweden Town Office had major upgrades, including a fresh exterior paint job and porch post repair, new cabinets and carpet in the back office, and mini splits installed to keep our employees and visitors comfortable year round.

OUR PEOPLE: With the Town Office fully staffed, our Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Treasurer, and Code Enforcement Officer were able to clear out a backlog of work. We celebrated Alberta Ridlon's many years of service to the Town at her retirement party in October. Alberta, Tommie McKenzie, and Julie McQueen were all recognized for their service and dedication to Sweden with 2023 Spirit of America Awards. Countless hours were logged in 2023 by Select Board Administrative Assistant Rose McKenzie, EMA Director Tommie McKenzie, and Road Commissioner Troy Morse, as they worked to provide the extensive documentation required for FEMA and MEMA emergency relief funds.

IMPROVED COMMUNICATION: We started the year by implementing a new emergency text messaging system, and encourage all to register your mobile phone number, landline number, or both. The system is

used to send out text and voicemail alerts about emergency conditions, general notices, and meeting reminders. Mailed reminders for both dog and vehicle registration started going out in 2023, and the Town website saw a major redesign, focused on providing more information on community resources, descriptions for boards and committees, and easier access to documents, minutes, and Town policies. In conjunction with ESRB (Eastern Slope Regional Broadband), the town is working to secure an agreement with a broadband provider that will bring true high speed connectivity to Sweden, with a completion date estimated sometime in 2025.

FIRE STATION: And rounding off the year, the Sweden Fire Station was at last put out to bid. Through the efforts of Tommie McKenzie and Susan Collins, the town is on target to be the recipient of a \$1,115,000 T-HUD appropriations grant for the fire station. As we await word of the Appropriations Bills passing into law, we are working to effectively leverage our UFB account money, budgeting so the Town is required to borrow less money to begin and complete the project.

In closing, we would like to thank all our board and committee volunteers for their contributions. Dear Friends:

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share an update on issues important to Maine and America.

One of my priorities for 2023 has been to improve the appropriations process in Congress – the way it decides how to spend taxpayer money. I took over as the Vice Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee last year. Along with Chair Patty Murray, we decided the best change we could make was not to do something new. Instead, it was to do something old – that is, go back to the regular and transparent committee process that we used to have.

Part of restoring this process included holding 50 public Committee hearings, which allowed for input from senators on both sides of the aisle. As a result, for the first time in five years, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed all twelve of its funding bills on time. This was done with strong bipartisan support. In fact, seven of them passed unanimously.

Now, we need to work with the House of Representatives to pass these twelve bills and turn them into laws.

These bills contain funding for a wide range of Maine priorities, including support for the workforce at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, our lobster industry, infrastructure improvements, affordable housing, biomedical research, veterans, and heating assistance programs like LIHEAP. These bills also contain nearly \$590 million in Congressionally Directed Spending for 231 projects throughout the State of Maine. These projects would help promote job creation, expand access to health care, and improve public safety, infrastructure, and important resources in communities across all 16 counties of our state. I will continue to work to get these bills signed into law in the new year.

On October 25, the horrific mass shooting in Lewiston claimed the lives of 18 Mainers and injured 13 others. In response, I led Maine's Congressional Delegation in requesting an independent investigation by the U.S. Army Inspector General into the events leading up to the shooting. On December 15, the Under Secretary of the Army wrote to inform me that such an investigation will take place, and the Army Inspector General has instructed her team to immediately begin preparing to conduct this investigation. While nothing can undo the events of October 25, I will continue to work to understand what happened and what could have been done differently, and to find answers for the victims, survivors, and their families.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,855th consecutive roll call vote.

As we look ahead to 2024, I remain committed to addressing the concerns of Maine families and communities. If you need assistance or wish to share your thoughts, please do not hesitate to reach out to one of my six state offices.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I've been working on behalf of the people of the Second Congressional District.

Maine's heritage industries are the backbone of our state's economy. That is why one of the first bills I introduced in this Congress was the *Northeast Fisheries Heritage Protection Act*, which would prohibit commercial offshore wind energy development in Lobster Management Area 1 (LMA 1) in the Gulf of Maine. LMA 1 was identified by the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) as a potential commercial offshore wind site. LMA 1 is a critical and highly productive fishing ground for a variety of sea life, including lobster. Prohibiting offshore wind development in LMA 1 would help to avoid conflict with the New England commercial and recreational fishing industries. Additionally, the bill would initiate a federal study on the environmental review processes of any relevant Federal agencies for offshore wind projects in the Gulf of Maine.

I also continue to advocate on behalf of our veterans and those providing care to our former service members. The current pay for VA employees in the Kennebec and Penobscot counties does not reflect the critical services they are providing. As the oldest state in the nation, with the fifth highest veteran population, Mainers rely on the services offered at the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) facilities. That's why recently, Senator Collins, Senator King, Representative Pingree, and I called on the Biden Administration to increase locality pay for VA employees in Kennebec and Penobscot counties. The level of care received is impacted by job vacancies, and the high turnover rate among its healthcare workforce is often the result of pay and compensation issues, which is further exacerbated by the increased cost of living.

Lastly, I'm excited that Mainers are continuing to reap the benefits of the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* (BIL). Recently, millions of dollars in grants have been awarded across the state, including \$35 million through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Culvert Aquatic Organism Passage (AOP) program to conserve spawning and migratory habitats for native fish species in Maine, \$460,000 through the Airport Infrastructure Grant (AIG) program for the Princeton Municipal Airport, Stephen A. Bean Municipal Airport, and Dexter Regional Airport, and nearly \$8 million through the Buses and Bus Facilities Program for Bangor's bus system. These investments are critical to ensuring Maine's infrastructure and will help to ensure Mainers and businesses across Maine are connected.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help answer questions about and navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. I want to thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve you in the Maine Senate. It has been an honor to work on your behalf to make our state an even better place to live, work and conduct business. I am grateful you have put your trust in me, and I will continue to work tirelessly on behalf of the people of Senate District 18.

The First Regular and First Special Sessions of the 131st Maine State Legislature were notable as there were over 2,600 legislative bill requests and 2,019 of them were officially printed as Legislative Documents (LDs). No legislature this century has had as many LDs printed during its first year.

One area of success was in the Highway Fund. In the past, the Highway Fund has been supported through gasoline taxes, which have been declining for years due to more fuel-efficient and electric/hybrid vehicles, and bonding. We are grateful to Kay Lyman, Gail Dewildt and Jill Welch for their service to the Society and are delighted to welcome Dan Drew, Rebecca Buyers and Nils Johnson as new Trustees/Officers.

Particular thanks goes to Doug Porter who has stepped down as President, and who continues to serve as Vice President. Doug has shepherded the Society for many years culminating with the beautifully restored Schoolhouse which serves as our meeting house and living museum now, and for years to come.

The 2023 year ended with the Society in a healthy financial position with a surplus of income over expenses and stable cash reserves. This was the result of successful sponsorships, events such as Sweden Days and t-shirts, sweatshirts and book sales. We are grateful to the Town of Sweden whose grant allowed us to purchase new computers which we have put to use archiving many historical documents, artifacts and photographs.

The highlights of the past year include the historic house tour of Kerry Welton's restored 1817 Church home on August 4 and the lighting of the Evergreen Tree held in conjunction with the Community Church on November 25.

Looking forward into 2024, we are excited to launch new publicity and fundraising campaigns to expand Society membership and raise funds through sponsorships, events and merchandising.



It's a magnificent forest now and the family gave one of their pastures to the community to be Steven's Cemetery.

Sweden has the following student enrollment as of October 1, 2023. This is submitted to the state for budgeting and subsidy purposes. Despite the movement into progressive grade levels, our total count is coincidentally unchanged from 2023 with a total of 39.

- Regular meetings of the MSAD 72 Board of Education are held on the second Wednesday of the month at 7 PM at the Molly Ockett School gymnasium. The first fifteen minutes of each Board meeting is designated for public participation. During this time, members of the public may express opinions and concerns related to matters regarding education or MSAD 72 schools. We welcome input however please note that this is not the venue to voice concerns concerning any individual employed by the school system or any particular student.
- In addition to the regular meetings, budget sessions will commence on April 10th and continue on April 24th. Once the budget is accepted by the Board, the Superintendent will visit multiple locations in May for presentation and discussion. Please see the District "Home" tab and scroll down to the "Calendar" for details. These meetings are also open for public questions and comments.
- The school system has a significant impact on our Sweden taxes. Our 39 students represent 3.6% of the total municipal allocation (7 towns). Sweden valuation increased slightly (8.2%) while our state subsidy (for Sweden) decreased slightly (estimated at \$-1,906) with the mil rate at 6.2. As a result, our expected cost to support the District will likely cause only a slight tax increase this budget cycle.
- As is the case in several other Maine School Districts and across the Country we are facing staff shortages. Our Administrative team, the Board and the Maine Department of Education have implemented many strategies to address this. Sweden Fire Department

Although we did not have quite as many responses as 2022 due to the heavy rains, the Sweden Fire Department stayed busy improving equipment, training and sending some members to specialized trainings.

A new Fire Station remains a top priority for the Department. New Federal and State mandates coming soon, will mandate procedures that cannot be done in our current facility. We will also be losing our spot to store Engine 4 in Bridgton, as they will be getting a new truck that will go in the space they graciously let us use for the past 2 years. I am trying to make arrangements to store it at another location.

Department members took part in 550 hours of training in 2023. In May, we participated in a Big Water Drill with our Mutual Aid Partners. At the conclusion, 1,000 GPM of water was maintained through Tank Trucks and portable tanks. This is one of the key components to lowering town insurance rates.

We continue to search to upgrade equipment that will benefit the Department and Town. The Department applied for and received two grants, an AFG Grant which the Department purchased new radios for the equipment and personnel and a Forestry Grant which allowed us to purchase more Forestry tools.

A reminder to citizens that your address number should be prominently marked, so personnel can locate you quickly in an emergency.

As always, Thank You to the Citizens, Select Board and our Mutual Aid Partners for their continued support. Our core mission is to provide the best service we can to the Community.

Annual Report from EMA Director

Greetings Sweden,

The year 2023 has been a busy one for the town starting with the Christmas Storm of December 22, a storm that flooded many area roads and took out the Haskell Hill Road culvert. This triggered the first of two disasters for the year, the second being the Mayday storm which also caused road damage and flooding in our area.

Having declared disasters this triggered federal assistance from FEMA. From the two storms we experienced almost \$1 million dollars in damage. Since the declaration I have been working closely with FEMA to mitigate the damage and recover the cost for repairs. This has been an extraordinarily long and tedious endeavor involving many meetings with the FEMA teams consisting of damage inventory meetings, site inspections, plan review, project development, project review and final inspection.

With this diligent work, the town hopes to recover approximately 90% of the expenses that were put out by the town for repairs. The recovery costs include 75% of federal funds, 15% of state funds and 10% of local funds. This all takes a great amount of time for the process to work, and it was over a year before receiving the first group of funds.

As stated, this has involved a great amount of time and I have spent more than two hundred hours working towards these goals. I have collaborated with our administrative assistant, the road commissioner, and the select board along with the FEMA team to accomplish these tasks.

There is still a lot of work to complete in this coming year with work to be done on Marr Road and Trull Brook Road, as well as work on Lee Gray Road. Work on these roads involves disaster recovery and repair work. The good news, since the Mayday storm we have truly experienced little additional damage to our roadways.

In other work for the emergency manager, I have been able to secure a federal grant in the amount of \$84,705.76 in federal funds for new communications equipment for the fire department. This included mobile radios and portable radios as well as installing a radio in the town office for emergency communications. The local amount of funds for this grant was \$4,235.29. This was also a long-term project, and I am pleased to report that the project is complete, and all equipment is in service as of this report.

As the Sweden Community is aware of the desperate need for a new fire station, and to help this process along I have made application to Senator Susan Collis for funding from Congressional Direct Spending, CDS, this is a Federal Grant request in the amount of \$1.15 million dollars to help with the building of the station. This request is currently in the final stages of being approved.

EMA also made a request to the Stephen and Tabitha King Foundation for a grant to be used for the purchase of AED's (Automatic External Defibrillator) this grant was in the amount of \$10,000. I am pleased to announce that we have received this funding. With these grant funds we will be able to purchase 5 AED units and a wall cabinet, these funds also include training for personnel. Units shall be deployed on fire apparatus, and one will be stationed in the town office. This shall benefit the community residents, adding a greater level of emergency response.

As you can see twenty-three has been a continually active year for Emergency Management. It has been my honor to be able to serve as your EMA Director. I shall continue to work towards mitigation of emergency incidents and to continue to work towards improving the safety of our community.

Sweden Planning Board Report

The Sweden Planning Board has had a busy year.

A large part of our year has dealt with finalizing updates to the Zoning and Land Use Ordinances, along with updating the Subdivision Ordinances. These updates will replace the current ordinances that have been in effect since 2009. Much has changed since 2009, including changes to State Law and even changes to Sweden itself. The updates reflect these changes.

The PB began work on the updates in early 2019. At the Town Meeting in 2020 the citizens approved an update budget of 25,000 dollars. We are pleased to report, to date the updates have cost a little over 12,000 dollars. We don't foresee any significant future additional costs. The PB was able to use many free resources during the update process, as well as excellent help from several town residents, to keep the cost down. The proposed updates are available on the Town Website, along with printed copies at the Town Office.

A well-advertised public hearing was held on Feb. 6th at the Town Meeting House. This was where the public asked questions and made comments concerning the updates. Once the hearing was over the comment period was closed. That is State Law. Based on several comments from the public, the PB made minor changes to the updates. It should be noted the PB held approximately three dozen workshops along with our regular monthly meetings. All were open to the public.

In addition to working on the updates, the PB has been busy with its normal duties. These include dealing with numerous conditional use permits, which require site walks and public hearings, along with working with our CEO reviewing permit applications and answering inquiries from the public.

Laura Chadbourne has served as PB secretary for the past 14 years. She will be stepping down as of the Town Meeting. Her deep knowledge of PB procedures, and willingness to carry the heaviest workload of any member, will be missed. Her attention to detail is reflected in our meeting minutes, that are available on the Town Website.

The PB will have three open positions to fill at the Town Meeting. One is for a five-year term and two are for alternate positions for one-year terms. Alternate positions represent an excellent way to learn PB procedures. Please consider joining our PB.

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

This letter is to update you on the activities of the Town of Sweden Comprehensive Planning Committee, the advisory body that produces the Comprehensive Plan in compliance with the State of Maine Growth Management Act, which was enacted by the State of Maine in 1989.

The Comprehensive Plan is the document that provides the "legal basis and rationale for any future ordinances or land use regulations that may be adopted by the town, as well as for all town governmental responsibilities and actions."

The Comprehensive Plan is not a law or an ordinance; it is a guiding document that provides a road map for Municipal Officers and others who are expected to carry out the strategies of the Comprehensive Plan.

Some of the practical things that the Comprehensive Plan does include offering legal Protection for Sweden town ordinances, helping Sweden qualify for certain state grants and loan programs and bringing the Sweden community together around shared goals.

There have been two Comprehensive Plans issued for Sweden to date; the first was in 1988 and the second was in 2004.

The current Comprehensive Planning Committee was launched in 2021 with 8 volunteer members appointed on April 14, 2021. Four members are no longer active on the committee including, Bill Graham (former chair), Bill Centamore, Dell Foss and Lynn Hopkins but their contributions are appreciated...

The remaining four members who are still active include Bruce Taylor (current chair), Julie McQueen (secretary), Mary Sohl and Gail deWildt. Nils Johnson is a new member, appointed in January 2024.

Since the launch in 2021, the Committee has been steadily working towards creating a new Comprehensive Plan. The committee has held 45 public meetings, issued a town survey in December 2021 and published the survey results in July 2022. In addition to the general public, the Committee has been actively seeking input from other Sweden boards, committees and appointees.

The majority of the Committee members' time has been spent collecting and analyzing the data necessary to produce an updated Comprehensive Plan in compliance with the State of Maine's guidelines. They have spent under \$2,500 to date of the \$10,000 appropriated at the Town Meeting in March of 2021, most of which was spent on the 2021 survey.

It is the Committee's plan to complete this work in 2024 and submit an updated comprehensive plan to the State of Maine and Town of Sweden in 2025. Once completed and approved, the Plan will be published on the Town's website as an official record.

Town of Sweden, Maine 2024 Budget Committee

It is the responsibility of the Budget Committee (BC) to make recommendations to the Select Board (SB) and to the Town on all matters related to the Town's budget. The BC has done their best to collaborate with the SB to recommend a thoughtful budget for 2024.

The recommendations for 2024 limit the use of the Unassigned Fund Balance (UFB). This is the fiscally responsible approach necessary to maintain a minimum of three to four (3-4) months of the Town's expense budget as recommended by the auditor. Thanks to the prudent stewardship of past select boards, funds were available when it became necessary to replace the bridge on Haskell Hill Rd. and make other emergency road repairs without a major tax rate increase. While the expectation is that some of the expenses for emergency road repair will be reimbursed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), there is no quarantee as to how much will be reimbursed or when funds will be received.

There are some appropriate uses of UFB, and one is to begin setting aside funds for

Article 29: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate and/or take from the unassigned fund balance for the purpose of future Town revaluation and allow the balance to carry over each year.

The State Constitution requires that a revaluation be done every ten (10) years. The last revaluation in the Town of Sweden was done 2017 and the assessor's agent is booking out to 2027, so it is important to make the commitment now to get on the 2027 schedule. Raising some money and taking some from the UFB every year for several years is the standard method of appropriating funds for this expenditure. The current cost would be approximately \$70,000 and there is \$16,000 remaining in the fund from the last revaluation. While the expectation is that the cost will increase some by 2027 so a little more may have to be raised in the last year; appropriating \$20,000 per year over the next 3 years is the responsible approach. A revaluation ensures that taxpayers are treated fairly, and failing to have the revaluation done puts the Town at risk of losing funding from the State.

Article 10. To see what sum the own will raise and appropriate for the purpose of snow removal and sanding for the ensuing year. The current contract expires in May of this year so the recommended appropriation is the same as last year, with the understanding that the SB will put it out to bid over the summer as required by the Town's Purchasing Policy. Once the bids are in, a Special Town Meeting (STM) will be required to take additional funds from the UFB for the increase.

A majority of the Budget Committee also supports Article 40: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital reserve account for a new fire station and transfer all funds (approximately \$188,000) from the State Aid Road Capital Account to the Capital reserve account for the new fire station.

Voters have been appropriating funds for State Aid Roads for several years, but there has never been a long-term plan for expending the funds. Redirecting the funds for a new fire station is in keeping with the intent to appropriate the funds for a Capital expense that ensures the safety of the Town of Sweden.

In April of 2023, a Fiscal Year 2024 Congressionally Directed Spending Request for \$1,150,000 was submitted to and supported by Senator Susan Collins as part of the FY2024 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development (THUD) Community Project Funding (CPF) program. The U.S. Senate passed the appropriations bill in November of 2023 which is awaiting approval from the US House to be enacted.

Even if the bill is enacted and the Town receives the grant, it is unlikely that it will cover the full expense of a new fire station and some funds will have to be borrowed. The capital account will allow the SB to reduce the amount to be borrowed. Voters will have to give the SB the authority to borrow the money, but an application was submitted to the Maine Municipal Bond Bank (MMBB) in Feb. as a proactive measure to get the Town pre-approved and able to act when the appropriations bill is enacted.

SWEDEN ROAD ADVISORY COMMITTEE

2/23/24

To: Sweden Taxpayers

The Road Advisory Committee (RAC) was formed in Sept. 2021 by the Select Board to review and make recommendations on upgrades, maintenance and expenses related the town's public roads.

We commend the Select Board and Road Commissioner on the successful repair of the Haskell Hill washout and the rebuilding of a majority of Webber Pond Rd. during 2023.

The RAC has made recommendations that we feel will continue to improve our road system and hope the Select Board and Road Commissioner will be available to discuss these prior to the start of the 2024 construction season.

With regards to the 2024 warrant items, the RAC unanimously approved the following at its meeting on 2/12/24:

ARTICLE 9: The RAC feels that proper maintenance is essential to help limit costs of future road reconstruction and therefore feels \$150,000.00 is a more reasonable budget cost and recommends the raising of \$75,000 as recommended by both the Select Board and the Budget Committee and taking an additional \$75,000 from the UFB.

ARTICLE 9a: The proposed amount of \$200,000 does not seem to be adequate considering inflation and the condition of Sweden's roads. In past years, 2016, 2019 and 2020, over \$100,000 has been requested without a noticeable improvement to the roads. Therefore, the RAC is recommending raising \$200,000 as recommended, taking an additional \$50,000 from the UFB and an additional from \$125,000 from the State Road Capital Account resulting in a total of \$375,000.00 and using this to reconstruct as much of Hardscrabble Road as the money will allow.

ATRICLE 10: The RAC feels that the \$285,000.00 recommended will not be sufficient for the 2024-25 snow removal, sanding and salting of town roads. Although the actual cost will not be known until pricing is requested and reviewed, it will be more than previous years and tax payers should allocate additional money.

<u>ATRICLE 40:</u> The RAC feels that tax payers have voted money for the State Road Capital Account for 15 +/- years with the intention of this money being spent on the town road system and should not be taken and used for other possible town expenses.

ATRICLE 41: The RAC feels that the Select Board be authorized to use LRAP funds in accordance with State Law.

Waste Disposal and Recycling

The Lovell Transfer Station is to be used for the disposal and recycling of wastes generated by Sweden property owners and residents. All materials must be taken to the Transfer Station. You may be asked to show proof of residency at the Transfer Station. The Town of Sweden supplies the Transfer Station with a current copy of all taxpayers in Sweden on an annual basis.

Waste Materials Accepted at the Lovell Transfer Station

The Lovell Transfer Station allows for the disposal of a wide variety of household and special wastes *including waste oil*, *refrigeration units*, *and tires* as shown below. Note that each of the acceptable items has its own special location and wastes must be sorted by the delivering party.

Wastes must be taken to the Lovell Transfer Station during the hours shown below. Disposal of Sweden wastes is allowed on the honor system. No stickers are required.
